

# SELMA REMEMBRANCE WALK Martin Luther King Five Days

## **Walk West**



Martin Luther King Park, Amsterdam

## 1. Martin Luther King Park

The park was named after Martin Luther King, Jr. to honor him after his assassination on April 4, 1968. Walk west though (A) Europaplein/(B) Station RAI and along RAI Convention Center to the Beatrix Park.

## 2. RAI - Beatrixpark

On August 16, 1964, reverend Martin Luther King preached during the Baptist World Conference in the RAI. The speech was broadcasted in the Netherlands, Germany, Sweden and Denmark. Watch the video on Andere Tijden. The Beatrix Park was partly designed by the first female urban Planner in the Netherlands, Jakoba 'Ko' Mulder and opened in 1938. She also designed the Amsterdamse Bos (Walk Southwest) Continue west along Zuider Amstelkanaal, IJsbaanpad, then north along Westlandgracht, a short walk through the Rembrandt Park and then eastbound to the Surinameplein.

#### 3. Monument of Awareness

On Surinameplein you see the monument Bon Fu Gron Prakseri, Tree of Life, to remember the shared history of Surinam, the Netherlands and the Dutch Antilles on behalf of the Committee June 30/Juli 1. Every year the abolition of slavery in the Netherlands, on July 1st 1863/1873 is commemorated during the Ceremony of Awareness. Walk further to the Vondelpark.

## 4. Vondelpark

The statue Mama Baranka (Mother Rock) in the famous Vondelpark, commemorates Kerwin Lucas Duinmeijer, a 15-yers-old schoolboy of Antillian descent who was stabbed on Dam Square (Walk Center) on August 20, 1983, by a 16-year-old skinhead with a '100% white' tattoo. Every year a commemoration is held so that we never forget where racism and intolerance can lead to. Walk further through Van Baerlestraat to the (5) Museumplein

## 5. Concertgebouw

In the Concertgebouw Martin Luther King was awarded with a honorary doctorate in Social Sciences, by Free University Amsterdam (VU, Walk Southwest). View the Polygoon News (Dutch, 1965) and read more on the 1965 page. Visit the Rijks Museum, Stedelijk or Van Gogh Museum, or continue south along Boerenwetering and Amstelkanaal to the Churchillaan

#### 6. Mahatma Gandhi

The assassinated Indian activist Mahatma Gandhi (1869-1948) was a great source of inspiration to Martin Luther King, Jr. He said: "Jesus gave us the goals and Gandhi gave us the tactics". Gandhi led the non-violent resistance to fight for the independence of India, what was realized on August 15, 1947. Every year on this location a commemoration takes place on October 2, Gandhi's birthday and the International Day of Non-Violence. Continue eastbound to the Merwedeplein.

### 7. Wilhelmina Drucker

On Churchilllaan stands the statue "The woman as a free man", in honor of Wilhelmina Drucker (1847-1925), 'Iron Mina', Dutch politician, feminist, writer and peace activist. Together with Aletta Jacobs she founded the association for women's suffrage. The artist who made the statue, Gerrit-Jan van der Veen, was a very active resistance fighter during WWII, who was shot to death in 1944.

In 1970 a korset was burnt at this statue by the second wave feminist activist group Dolle Mina's (named after Wilhelmina Drucker). Walk right, to the Waalstraat up to Merwedeplein.

#### 7. Anne Frank

The Frank family with their two daughters Margot and Anne lived at Merwedeplein 37-II until they had to hide from the nazi's in 1942 in the Anne Frank House (Walk Center). Anne bought her world famous red checkered diary around the corner on Rooseveltlaan 62, in a still existing book shop, Jimmink. In the pavement in front of Merwedeplein 37 are four Stolpersteine to remember the Frank family, by German artist Gunter Demnig, memorials in front of the homes of those who were persecuted and deported in WWII. In Amsterdam are 600 Stolpersteine, in Europe 75,000.

Walk through Waalstraat and Kennedylaan the last stretch to the Martin Luther King Park. lacktriangle
